*Regional Profile of Poor Households*

National Household Targeting Office





## INTRODUCTION

**National Household Targeting System for Poverty Reduction (NHTS-PR) is an information management system that identifies who and where the poor are.** This makes available to national government agencies and other social protection stakeholders a pioneer database consisting of a comprehensive organization of information of the poor households nationwide<sup>1</sup>.

**The first of its kind in the Philippines,** this database is used for the following: 1.) analyzing who and where the poor are; 2.) focus targeting of social protection programs to the poor that reduces leakage or under-coverage ; and 3.) objectively identify beneficiaries of social protection programs of various government and non-government agencies, civil society and basic sectors.

**Executive Order No. 867 issued in March 2010** has directed all National Government Agencies (NGAs) to adopt the results of NHTS-PR in identifying prospective beneficiaries for their social protection programs nationwide.

**The household assessments were completed last December 2009.** Nationwide, the NHTSPR was able to assess **10,909,456 households** in the 17 regions, 80 provinces, and 137 cities and 1493 municipalities nationwide. Of these assessed households, 10,840,452 were subjected to **Proxy Means Test (PMT)** resulting to **5,255,118 households** identified as poor. Likewise in **MIMAROPA** region, the NHTSPR was able to assess **513,759 households** with **242,633 identified poor households** covering five provinces, two cities, 71 municipalities, 1,458 barangays in seven congressional districts.

PMT is a statistical model that estimates household income using proxy variables or income predictors. The assessment was supported by two major activities, On-Demand Application and Validation. These activities respond to issues of under coverage and inclusion of non-poor households. These processes aim to ensure the integrity of the database before sharing it with other government agencies and social protection stakeholders. The database of the poor is for updating after four years.

This profile of the poor households will highlight the relevance and importance of understanding the poor households' status and subsequently recommend interventions that will respond to poverty.

The summary gives us the profile of the poor households answering two major themes of "who and where the poor are." The answers to the questions shall be briefly described using the composition of the poor household; the household members' highest educational attainment and occupation; features of the housing structure and access to basic services or facilities like water, electricity and sanitary toilet; households' ownership of assets; tenure status of housing; and difference in cost of living.



**BRIEF BACKGROUND ON WHO AND WHERE THE POOR HOUSEHOLDS ARE**

The MIMAROPA regional map shows where magnitude of poor households by municipalities (red shaded areas) are found.

The Province of Palawan posted the biggest percentage share of 40.0% or a total of 95,952 identified poor households. Palawan is trailed by Oriental Mindoro with 30% percentage share or 73,878 poor households. The other three provinces are Occidental Mindoro with 19% or 37,421, Romblon 21,230 9% share while the last is the province of Marinduque with 6% or 14,152 poor households. The biggest variation of percentage share of poor households (e.g Palawan) is akin to the geographical size and the population count enumerated per province<sup>3</sup>.

Most of these poor households are found in rural areas with 83.7% share while 16.3% are in urban areas.

In terms of the magnitude of Poor households at the municipal level, the top five (5) municipalities are Puerto Princesa City with 9,769 and Taytay with 9,545 in Palawan; Naujan (8,818) in Oriental Mindoro, San Jose (8,158) in Occidental Mindoro and (7,796) in Pinamalayan, Oriental Mindoro.

**MAGNITUDE OF POOR REGION IV-B (MIMAROPA)**

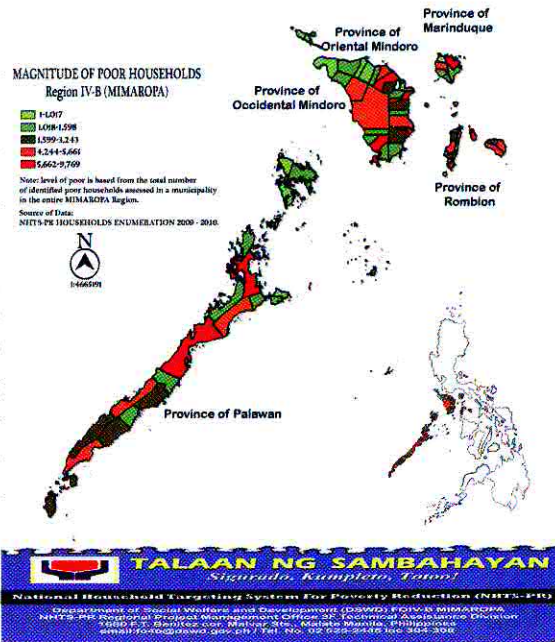

Of the 242,633 poor households identified regionwide, 90% are found to earn below the annual per capita poverty threshold of P15,057.005 (the needed income for a family of six members to be out of poverty). This means that a poor household with six (6) members earns PhP41.22 per day. Majority of the poor household in MIMAROPA region is within the decile 1 with 114,413 poor households located throughout the island municipalities of the region<sup>4</sup>.

The poor households whose incomes are way below the thresholds can be correlated with the type of occupation they are engaged in and their highest level of education attained.

Table A. Primary Occupation of Age 15 year old and above by Educational Attainment

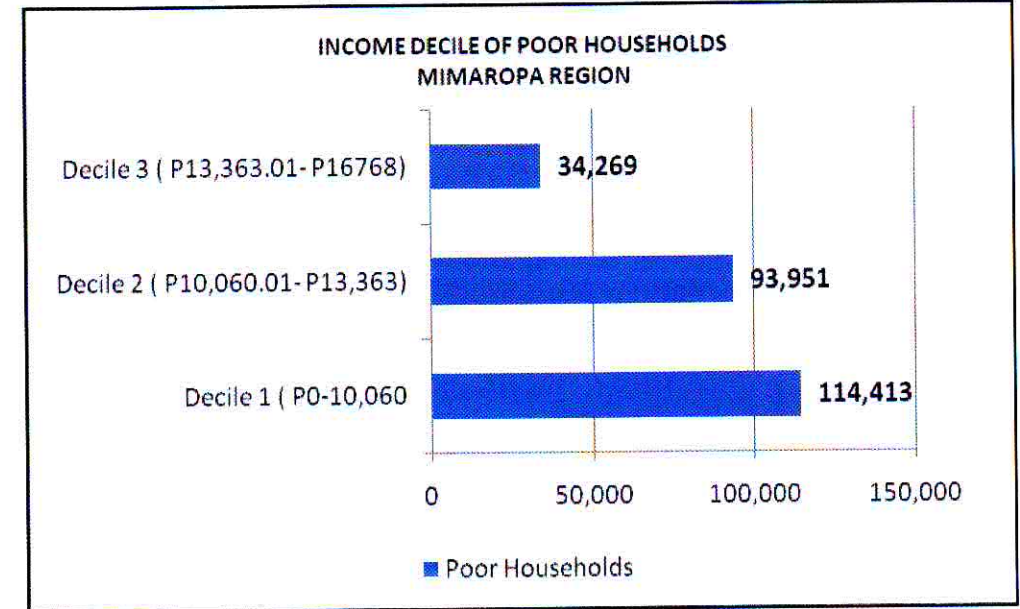

One attribution to the data on occupation could be in the educational attainment of women in poor households. In MIMAROPA, majority of the poor women with no occupation reached elementary ( 47.77%) and high school (36.81%) levels as opposed to the nationwide statistics where and those women without occupation were not able to finish or complete any grade level at all.

The data also shows that the shares of poor women in poor households in terms of educational attainment are almost equal with 7.79% and 7.13% both for no grade completed and college levels respectively.

*Persons with Disability (PWD), Senior Citizens and Indigenous Peoples (IP) Group*

There are 10,263 poor households all over MIMAROPA region with members with disability. At an average, 2,053 households have a member who has any of the following disability, i.e. hearing and visual impairment, speech defect, orthopedic, multiple disabilities, and mentally challenged. Likewise, visual impairment is the highest recorded disability in the region with 2,038 poor households<sup>6</sup>.

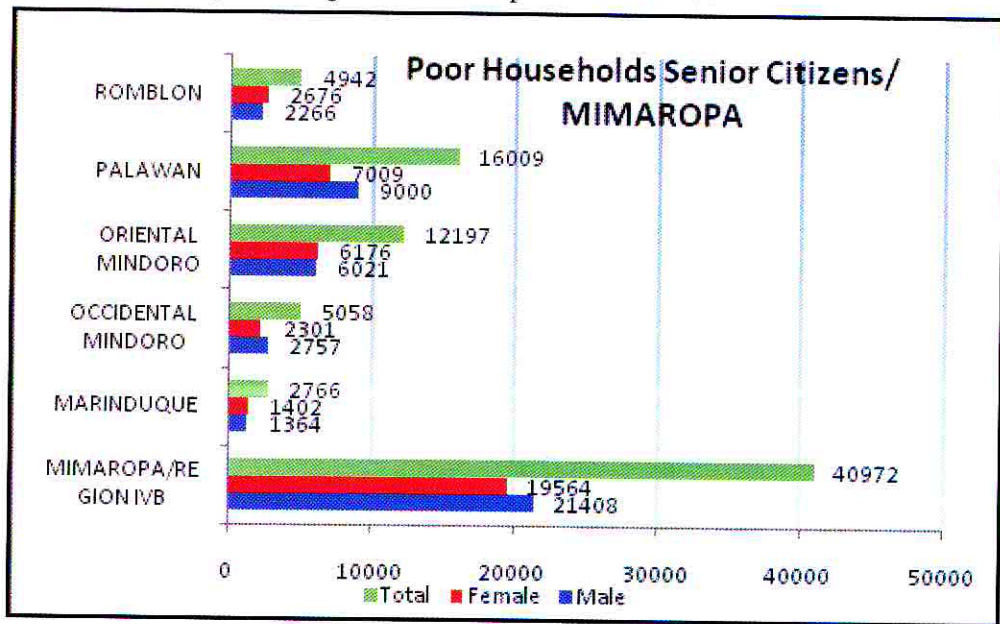

There are about 40,972 senior citizens poor households head region wide. Mostly, they are found in the provinces of Palawan, Oriental Mindoro and Romblon.

In MIMAROPA there are 48,877 poor households who consider themselves as part of an IP group. They are mostly found in the provinces of Palawan, Oriental and Occidental Mindoro.

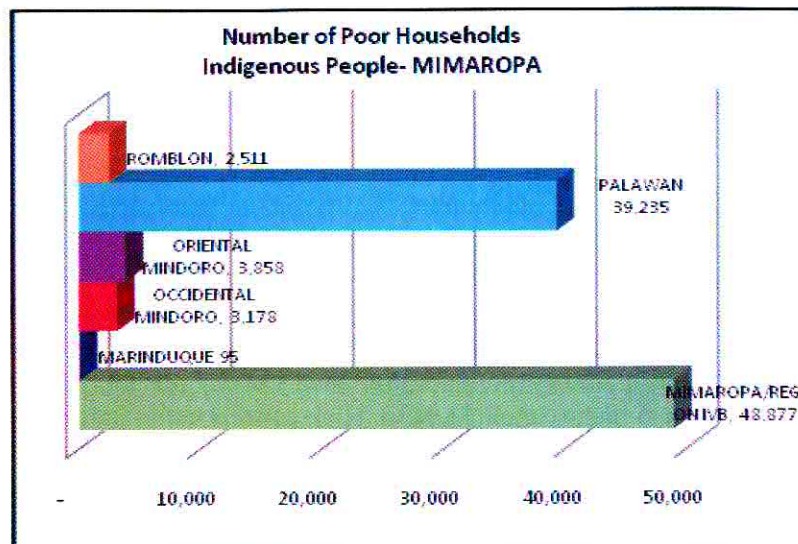

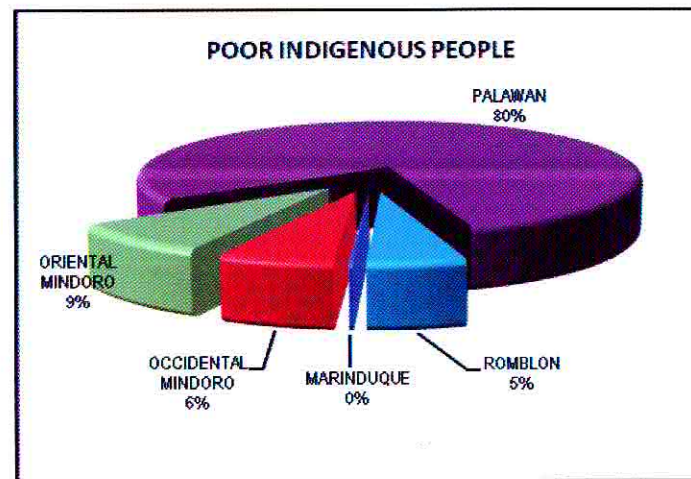

## Who and where the poor households are in terms of educational attainment

Majority or 75% of the poor individuals age 3-18 years old are attending school. They can be found in the provinces of Marinduque (85.2%), and Romblon (82.8). On the other hand, Occidental Mindoro, Palawan and Oriental Mindoro have below 80% attendance to school with 74.1%; 73.4 and 71.4 percentages respectively.

Those who do not attend school are mostly found in the provinces of Oriental Mindoro, Palawan and Occidental Mindoro<sup>7</sup>.

The poor individuals put importance to education as evidenced by their attendance to school. Looking into age by level of schooling, 87.9% of 6-11 years old children are attending elementary, 80.9% of 12-15 years old are attending high school, and 13.8% are attending the collegiate level. Notable is that most of the total poor households with school age children attends public schools.

The highest educational attainments of poor individuals are significant in the levels of elementary (62.15%) and high school (31.91%). High concentration of these poor individuals can be found in the provinces of Palawan, Oriental and Occidental Mindoro.

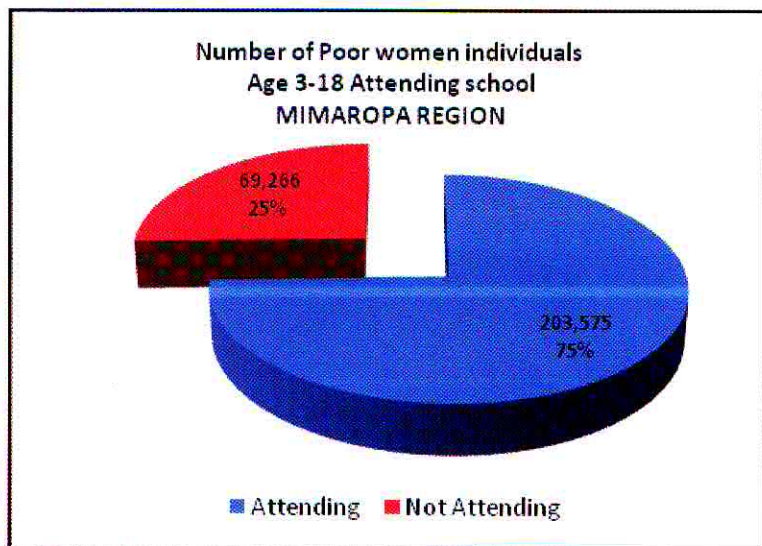

## Who and where the poor households are in terms of occupation?

The poor household sources their income either through farming/fishing (1%) or as laborers to different menial jobs. Quite notable is the number of the members of poor households declaring no occupation which comprises 98% (given that the age range for the table is 15 years old and above)<sup>8</sup>.

Majority of the members of the poor households who have declared no occupation are found in Palawan and Oriental Mindoro.

The urban poor and rural poor in MIMAROPA region do not differ in their types of occupation. Both urban and rural poor have the same highest share in the occupational category as farmers/forestry workers/fisherfolks, laborers and unskilled workers; and service workers. In urban poor the percentages are 54.97% (16,719); 31.78% (9,666) and 4.15% (1,262) respectively.

For the rural poor, 111,490 (74.46%) are farmers, forestry workers and fisherfolks. This is followed by laborers and unskilled workers with 27,829 (18.59%) and third most common type of occupation is service workers with 2,968 or 1.98%.

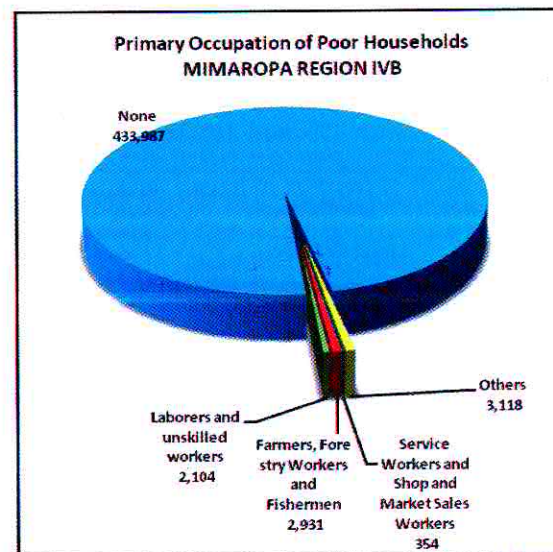

## Household Features of Poor Households

Almost half of the poor households in Region IV-B or 146,234 out of 242,633 poor households have roof that are made of light materials (cogon, nipa or bamboo). Same is true for the outer walls having 155,750 poor households with walls made of light materials. Based on these data, more than 60% of the poor households are considered to be vulnerable to natural/man-made disasters as they used light construction materials on the roofs and outer walls of their housing units<sup>9</sup>.

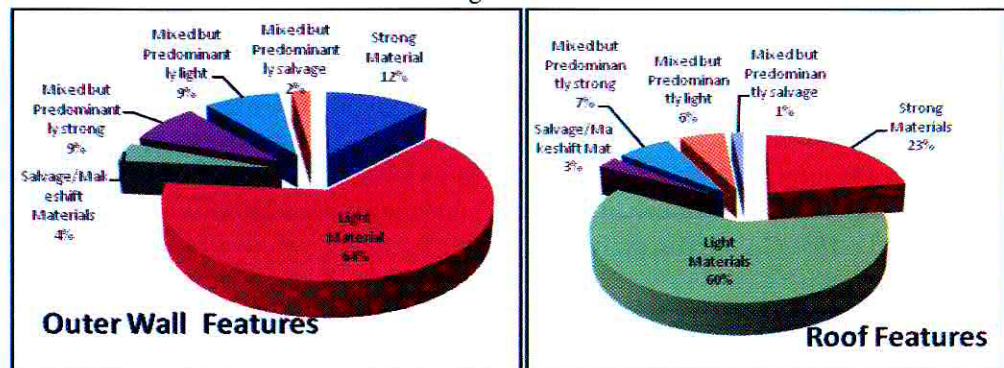

In terms of the tenurial status, nearly half (46%) or 112,462 of the poor households in MIMAROPA have their Own house and lot while 38 percent own house and lot but with free consent of the owner. These poor households can be mostly found in the Provinces of Palawan and Oriental Mindoro with 45% and 24% respectively.

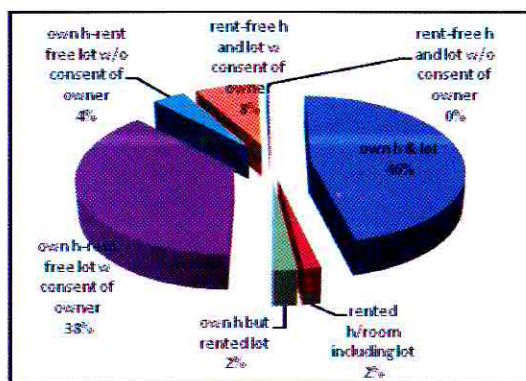

Furthermore, this situation is aggravated as poor households' minimal access to basic service facilities is also high (see Table B.)

For water and sanitary toilet facilities<sup>10</sup>, it can be noted that the magnitude of poor households with safe water source<sup>11</sup> is relatively high at 59.34% and that access to sanitary toilet is also fairly high with 53.28%. However, the number of poor households with no safe water<sup>12</sup> source combined with unsanitary toilet practices is still fairly high with 98,663 or 40.66% of the total number of identified poor households. The provinces with high incidences of households with no access to safe water source and have unsanitary<sup>13</sup> practices are Palawan, Oriental and Occidental Mindoro.

The magnitude of poor households who have no access to electricity is more than halfway (68%) from the total poor households (164,885) for the entire MIMAROPA. The areas still with no access to electricity can be found in the island barangays of the provinces of Palawan, Romblon and Occidental Mindoro. Communities in the hinterlands with no access to electricity are found in the provinces of Oriental Mindoro and Marinduque.

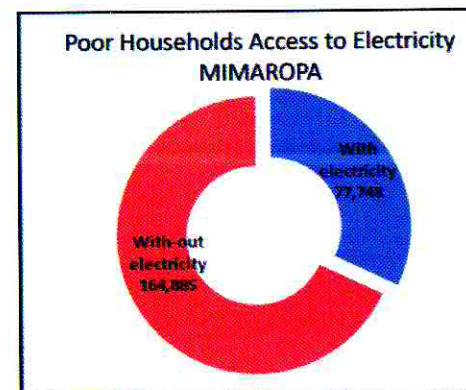

Further, it can be distinctively compared that the access of rural and urban poor households to electricity<sup>14</sup> is rather contrasting. 39.6% of the poor households in urban area are found to have access to electricity while 69.4% have no access in the rural areas.

Out of the 242,633 poor households, only 38,998 or 16.4% of them have Philhealth cards, 57,896 or 24.42% received subsidized rice and 59,408 or 25.06% received other services<sup>15</sup>.

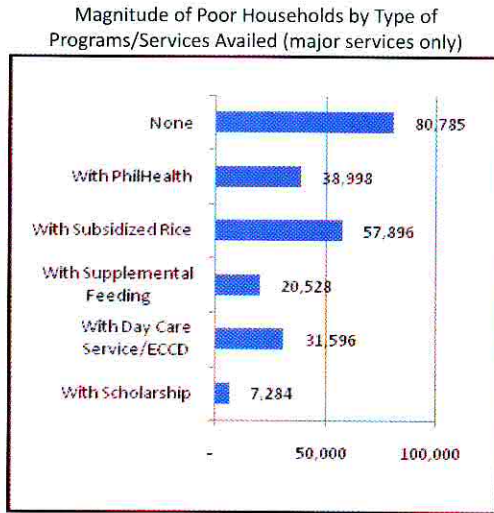

However, it is quite alarming that 80,785 or 34.08% of poor households do not receive any programs or services from the government, LGUs and NGOs.

Certain conveniences are also part of the features of the poor household. Assets such as Television, VCD/DVD, Furniture, cellphone/telephone are but a few of the poor households owned assets<sup>16</sup>.

It is quite interesting to note that the priority of our poor households is entertainment (see figure 15).

Ownership of Assets of Poor Households

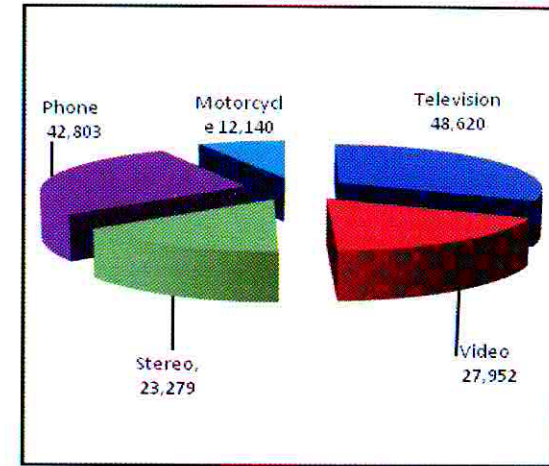
